Part 2: From Sardinia to Badalona

The PartArt4OW SailingLab has completed its Mediterranean voyage. From the industrial waterfronts of Sardinia to the protected shores of Menorca, from the wet-wipe pollution crisis in Barcelona to the closing celebrations in Badalona, here's everything that happened on the final leg of the journey, with links to video documentaries, the navigation diary, and interviews along the way.

Sardinia: Industry, tradition and the tuna trade

Cagliari, Sarroch & Carloforte — 10-16 July

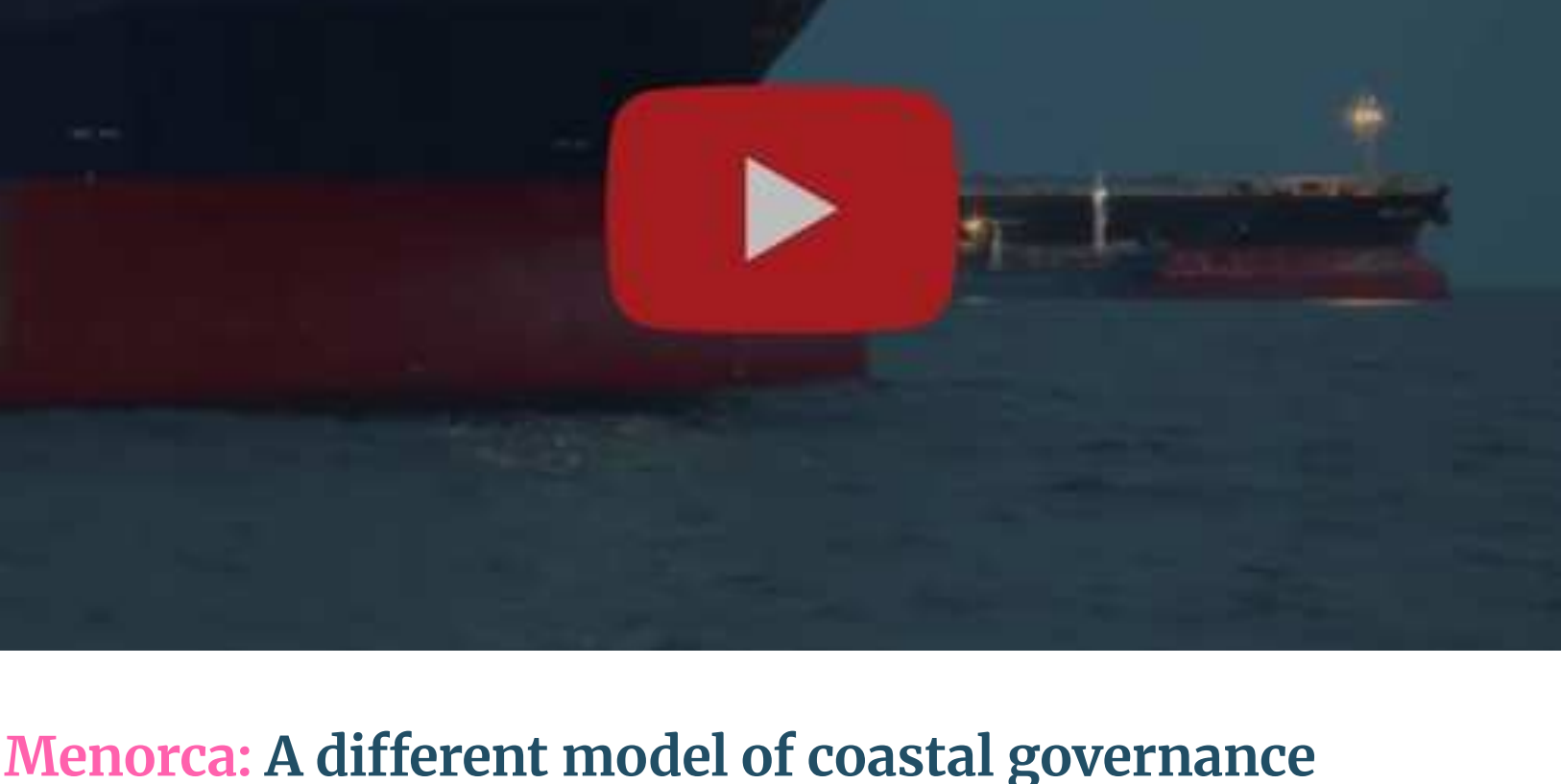
After a demanding 255-nautical-mile crossing from Salerno, including a night at anchor in Villasimius and two days battling 18-25 knot south-easterly winds, the crew reached Cagliari to patch up both boat and bodies. Along the coast, the SailingLab documented a landscape of stark contrasts: the redevelopment of Cagliari's historic marina into a luxury complex for superyachts stood alongside the stalled Porto Canale, a commercial port marked by decades of construction delays and corroded, abandoned cranes.

Continuing west, the crew passed the Sarroch petrochemical complex, one of the largest oil refining facilities in the Mediterranean, before anchoring at Capo Spartivento and Portopino en route to Carloforte.

In Carloforte, local guide Natalia Lapicca introduced the crew to the Tonnara PIAM, the last active tuna fishery in the Mediterranean still operating in its original 1859 facilities. Here, the tonnaretti (traditional tuna fishers) continue to pass down centuries-old techniques, working within the EU's strict bluefin tuna quota system that balances economic value with conservation.

Menorca: A different model of coastal governance

Mahón & Ciutadella — 19-22 July

After a 190-nautical-mile international crossing from Carloforte, passing through one of the Mediterranean's key cetacean corridors, the SailingLab reached Menorca, mooring in Mahón and Ciutadella. As a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, Menorca protects extensive *Posidonia oceanica* meadows through some of the region's most advanced marine conservation policies.

Yet even here, the ocean's interconnectedness was visible: micro- and mesoplastics carried by currents were spotted in Menorcan waters, alongside the invasive blue crab, an alien species introduced by commercial shipping that has thrived as sea temperatures rise. In the large harbour of Mahón, the crew also documented the well-known conflict around the privatisation of sea access, as the loss of free anchoring space threatens the 'social anchoring' spots long used by local sailors and fishers.

Crossing to Barcelona

22-24 July

The SailingLab sailed 120 nautical miles from Menorca to Barcelona, operating throughout as a fully functional scientific and creative laboratory. This leg of the journey, from Salerno to Barcelona, via Sardinia and Menorca, carried the crew across nearly an entire time zone, from the 14th to the 2nd meridian: both a geographical and a conceptual passage across the Mediterranean.

WIPES OUT!: Turning hidden pollution into shared action

Barcelona — 24 July

In Barcelona, the SailingLab crew joined the final event of Wipes Out!, the PAI confronting one of the Mediterranean's most overlooked pollution sources: flushed wet wipes travelling from bathrooms through sewers and rivers into coastal waters. The evening opened with Chiara Certomà introducing Part Art, followed by Chantal Menard presenting the Wipes Out! project itself.

An interactive dance performance gave artistic and emotional form to the struggle of marine organisms suffocated by wet wipes, while Anna Bozzano spoke about the rapidly growing ecological alarm surrounding the issue.

Badalona: Journey's end, and a new beginning

26-28 July — Second PartArt4OW Demo Days

After more than 900 nautical miles, the SailingLab crew reached its final destination: Badalona, just five miles north of Barcelona. In the harbour, La Fura dels Baus hosted the Second PartArt4OW Demo Days, where representatives of the five Participatory Art Initiatives encountered along the route gathered to present the results of their work, demonstrating how art and science can drive civic engagement for ocean health.

It was a vital moment to reunite with partners and refine the routes for the upcoming third phase of the project. As the crew learned throughout the expedition, the project has not reached its end, because every arrival is a new beginning.

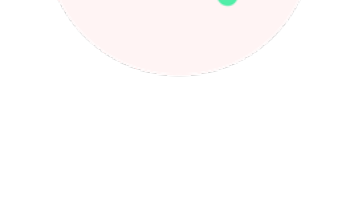
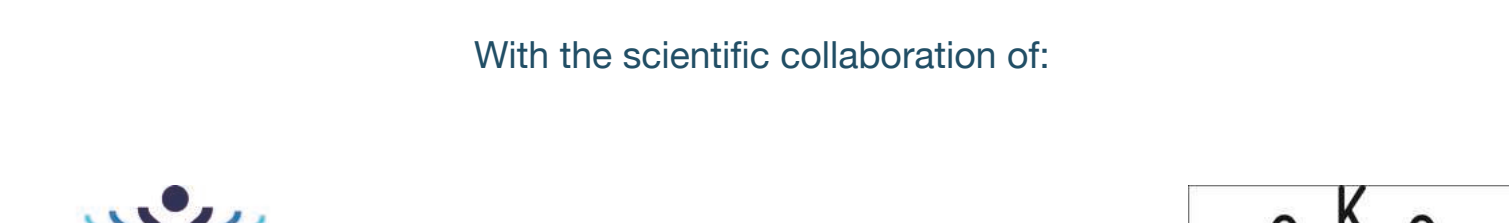
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
